

Mike O'Connell started his career in law enforcement in 1972 as a patrol officer in Riverdale, and rose through the ranks to serve as the department's chief for six years. In 1995, he was appointed chief in Tinley Park where he served for 16 years.

On May 11<sup>th</sup>, 2011, Chief Michael O'Connell passed away at Ingalls Hospital in Harvey due to complications from heart surgery.

He was president of the South Suburban Association of Chiefs of Police in 1993-94, and continued as a member of the organization's executive board. In 2005, he was named Police Chief of the Year by the Illinois State Crime Commission.

Chief O'Connell also was involved in the Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police and taught criminal justice at South Suburban College. A graduate of Thornton Township High School in Harvey, Chief O'Connell had a master's degree in criminal justice from Lewis University and was a graduate of the FBI National Academy and Northwestern University's School of Police Staff and Command. Chief O'Connell served on several committees aimed at strengthening law enforcement in the south suburbs, including a stint as head of the disaster training committee for the south suburban chiefs group.

He was 60 years old.

# Department Structure

## Chief of Police

The police department is led by the Chief of Police, Steven Neubauer. The Chief of Police supervises all three divisions of the Police Department. Subsequently, a Commander is in charge of each Division. Within each division are groups, sections, and units which carry out the police department's operational, administrative and investigative activities.

## Administration


Sergeant Charles Faricelli oversees the Administration Division which controls key functions of the police department. His duties include budget preparation, administrative court, fleet maintenance, D.A.R.E., crime prevention, personnel and records management.

## Investigations

Commander Pat McCain leads three investigators who follow up on crimes and suspected criminal activity reported to the police department. Several investigations are also initiated should they receive information on suspected criminal activity. Investigators also process crime scenes for evidence, follow crime trends, develop sources of information, act as liaisons between the schools and police department, and provide public presentations on a variety of topics. Although each investigator has his/her own area of expertise, such as auto theft, burglary and fraud, all are crossed trained and have the necessary knowledge, skills and abilities to investigate any type of crime.

## Operations

Commander Steve Vaccaro is head of the Operations Division, which includes all uniformed personnel. The division is responsible for controlling and preventing crime through regular patrol, answering calls for service, parking enforcement, investigating accidents that result in serious injury or death, apprehending offenders, crime scene processing services, managing crowds at large public events, enforcing traffic laws, and directing operations at critical events.

## 911 Center Projects

### Cad/RMS Project

*Current Cad/RMS vendor, SunGard Public Sector advised in January, 2008, of their intent to discontinue the Cad6 product line. Current SunGard customers would be responsible for purchasing SunGard Public Sector's OSSI or NaviLine Cad product lines, or selecting another vendor for Cad/RMS. Current Cad product also offers no GIS/mapping capabilities.*

### Village Wide Graphical Information System (GIS)

*Village of Tinley Park joined a GIS consortium in November, 2011. This agreement will allow all village departments to share electronic mapping data through a digital mapping program.*

### Public Safety Recording System

*911 Center currently uses Nice Scenario Replay Recording System. This system was purchased and installed in October, 2006. This system has experienced several critical failures, resulting in loss of several hours of recordings. Information Technology staff advised it is critical this component must be replaced in the 2012-2013 capital budget. Staff will be evaluating new recording software to ensure our agency's needs are met and to ensure compliance with Next Generation 911 Requirements.*

### Back Up 911 Center

*Public Works and Information Technology are currently in the process of completing the installation of radio and telephone equipment in the approved back up 911 Center site, located at the Police Department. This location will be utilized as secondary Public Safety Answering Point (P.S.A.P). in the event the primary P.S.A.P. is unavailable due to a major component failure or an emergency situation. All funding for this project has been approved in previous budgets. No date has been set at this time for the completion of the back up facility.*

## Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP)

The Village of Tinley Park 911 Command Center is the Primary Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) for the Village of Tinley Park. Telecommunicators in the Center handle all emergency, non-emergency and administrative calls for Police, Fire, and Emergency Medical Services (EMS) in the Village of Tinley Park.

Elite Radio equipment, Siemens Telephone Equipment, T.T.Y. capabilities, H.T.E. Cad and Records Management software, L.E.A.D.S. 2000 , Fox Valley Fire Alarm Monitoring software, AVTEK City Watch Emergency Notification software, Milestone closed circuit television software, and other in-house computer programs.

The 911 Center also is equipped with a Motorola Star Com base radio and EMNET computer terminal.

## 911 Center Renovations

The Village of Tinley Park 911 Command Center was renovated in Spring 2009. Upon receiving funding from the Cy-Pres Grant, the 911 Command Center workstations were upgraded and reconfigured in order to ensure that our Public Service Answering Point (PSAP) continues to operate with reliable, state-of-the art equipment. Previous dispatch consoles did not facilitate the expansion of future public safety communications equipment.

Six automated sit to stand full-lift workstations were installed. There are currently six flat-screen computer monitors at each of these workstations. Busy user status display poles have been installed at each dispatch workstation, which are integrated with the existing telephone and radio system, and indicates if an employee is busy on telephone, radio, or out of service.

The new consoles are capable of accommodating a variety of computer, communications, display, environmental controls and operator interface devices. The design, configuration and placement have addressed the functional, ergonomic and aesthetic requirements of our public safety work environment, while allowing for future equipment retrofits and full reconfigurations without requiring major modification of the existing structure.

In addition, each workstation is equipped with wireless push-to-talk (PTT) headset adapters. New carpeting and flooring were also installed to accommodate the reconfigured room layout.





## Staffing

The 911 Center is staffed 24 hrs./day, 7 days a week. Minimum staffing requirements for each of three shifts in the 911 Command Center are as follows:

- Days (0700-1500 hrs.)-3 telecommunicators
- Afternoons (1500-2300 hrs.)-3 telecommunicators
- Midnights (2300-0700 hrs.)-3 telecommunicators

Minimum staffing requirements on all shifts are increased during summer months and critical incidents.

Full-time telecommunicators select their shifts annually by seniority. To ensure the 911 Center is adequately staffed at all times, part-time telecommunicators assist by filling available shifts on a weekly basis. Current approved staffing in the 911 Center is:

- Communications Supervisor (1)
- Administrative Assistant (1)
- Lead Telecommunicators (3)
- Full-Time Telecommunicators (9)
- Part-Time Telecommunicators (6)

## CCTV Monitoring

Located in the Village of Tinley Park 911 Command Center is the Close Circuit Television (CCTV) monitoring center. The monitoring center is staffed four days per week from 2000-0300 hrs.

Using the Milestone CCTV software, on-duty CCTV operators view both fixed and pan-tilt-zoom images to monitor activity in the village's downtown area, Oak Park Metra Station, and 80th Avenue Commuter Lot. CCTV operators alert telecommunications staff, who in turn

dispatch public safety personnel to respond to reports of suspicious or criminal activity occurring within the area.

## Illinois TERT

The Village of Tinley Park has joined the Illinois Telecommunicator Emergency Response Taskforce (IL-TERT). IL-TERT is an Intergovernmental Mutual Aid program intended to provide teams of highly qualified public safety telecommunicators to:

- Respond rapidly to the scene of disaster situations any place within the state of Illinois
- Respond to disaster situations out of state under the Emergency Management Assistance Compact (EMAC)
- Provide assistance to other Illinois Public Safety Answering Points (PSAP) that encounter crisis situations, and provide advice to agencies that wish to develop local tactical dispatch teams. Currently, there are 40 IL-TERT member agencies within the state.

## Premise Alert Program

The Police Department and the 911 Command Center have implemented a program to assist residents in the event of an emergency.

On August 28, 2009, Senate Bill 2057-Premise Alert Program became law. The Illinois Premise Alert Program (PAP) allows individuals with disabilities or special needs, their families or care-givers to register with local police, fire, and/or ambulance agencies. The information provided will supply public safety first responders with potentially life-saving information about their conditions if called upon to provide emergency service.

In accordance with this act, the Police Department and 911 Center have invited residents to voluntarily submit a form regarding their conditions. Once completed, the department is able to "flag" the residence with the particular special needs of the resident, enabling the telecommunicator to quickly inform responding public safety personnel of the nature of the problem.

## Chaplain Program

**R**esearch to start a Chaplain Program began in the summer of 2001 by Officer Rich Adamski. He led the development of the program by attending national and local conferences and speaking with other police departments on how to implement and maintain a successful program. The program is designed to provide spiritual guidance, without regard to specific religious beliefs, to every member of the Tinley Park Police Department, primarily due to the nature of the calls that are handled (e.g. deaths, shootings, etc.) and the stress of the police profession.



Each church in Tinley Park, regardless of denomination, was visited to explain the purpose of the program and to recruit interested clerical volunteers to support the program. Deacon Ken Zawadzki from St. Stephens's Church was selected based upon his interest in the program and passing a background investigation.

Officer Adamski serves as the Chaplain Liaison, who acts as a 'go between' for all members of the police department and the chaplains. Every police department member was introduced to the police chaplains and provided their contact information. Utilization of the program is strictly confidential and confidentiality will only be broken if any person threatens suicide or serious harm to themselves or another individual. In this event, the police chaplain will reach out to the appropriate resource (s) available to prevent any injury.

Chaplain's have blessed department members prior to annual departmental meetings, assisted with death notifications, and have ridden side-by-side with patrol officers to observe daily police functions. Deacon Zawadzki said "I really enjoy speaking with the officers for 15 minutes on training days and getting to learn their personalities. It reminds them that I'm here for them, and they learn about me as well."

## Crime Prevention and the Community Resource Unit

In response to the growing demand for specialized services from the residents of Tinley Park, the Community Resource Unit (CRU) was formed. This provides citizens an outlet for needs that exist beyond standard law enforcement functions.

Since 2007, the *National Association of Town Watch* has awarded the Village of Tinley Park a National Award Winner for its outstanding participation in National Night Out, crime, drug and violence prevention programs.

### Child Passenger Safety Program

Four certified child passenger safety technicians are available to assist residents by verifying that child safety seats are properly installed. Residents can call 708-444-5326 to set up an appointment for an inspection. The inspections are performed by Officers London and Zylka, Civilian Crime Prevention Officer Dina Navas and Auxiliary Traffic Officer Mike Leonard. Technicians participate in National Seat Check Saturday by holding an inspection checkpoint in a business location in the Village. On Sept. 24, 2011; twenty-four seats were checked during this event. During 2011, there were ninety-six child safety seats checked. Technicians educated the public about child safety seats, seat belt laws and safety laws at community events. These events included community group tours of the Police Department, IL Occupant Protection Booth at the Chicago Auto Show, Tinley Park Chamber meetings, South Suburban College Women's Conference, Strong Children Strong Families, Cops and Rodders, Discover Tinley, National Night Out, and K-Mart Safety Days.

### Be A Buckle Buddy Program

Be A Buckle Buddy is a public education program aimed at keeping kids safe in cars. Anyone in Illinois can call 1-888-800-2642, or log onto [www.bucklebuddy.org](http://www.bucklebuddy.org), to anonymously report unbuckled kids. Owners of

reported vehicles get a packet of information about car seat safety and Illinois law.

When a person sees an unbuckled child in a vehicle they can call 1-888-800-2642 or logs onto [www.bucklebuddy.org](http://www.bucklebuddy.org) and gives the license plate number, vehicle description, date, city and county. Children's Hospital of Illinois checks the hotline and website, records only pertinent information, and then faxes reports to local law enforcement partners. Law enforcement partners retrieve reported vehicles' owner information and mail out Be A Buckle Buddy packets.

### Elderly Service Officer Program

There are five sworn Elderly Service Officers; Richard Adamski, Robert Shervino, Rudy Rosillo, Scott Heim, Perry Dubish and one civilian Elderly Service Officer Dina Navas. As the senior population of our community continues to grow the needs of our residents are increasing. The Elderly Service Officers are trained to refer residents over age 62 to the Illinois Department on Aging agencies; South Suburban Senior Services of the Catholic Charities, PLOWS Council on Aging, and the Will County Department on Aging. During 2011 fifty-five senior residents received assistance with referrals from the Tinley Park Police Department.

Dina Navas was recognized by the IL Attorney General Lisa Madigan as one of eight IL Outstanding Elderly Service Officers for outstanding services to older citizens. This award was presented at the National TRIAD Conference which was held at the Tinley Park Convention Center October 3-5, 2011.

### Seniors and Law Enforcement Together (S.A.L.T.)

The Seniors And Law Enforcement Together Organization meets monthly, February thru December on the first Monday of each month at the Tinley Park Police Department. Each month a guest speaker gives a presentation on topics of interest to senior citizens. The goal is to educate our seniors so that they do not become victims of crime. There are currently sixty-eight members who have graduated the Senior Citizen Law Enforcement Academy. Approximately thirty members attend the monthly meetings.

### National Night Out

Tinley Park Police Department participated in the 28<sup>th</sup> Annual National Night Out celebration on Tuesday, August 2, 2011, in the parking lot of the Super K-Mart Shopping Center, 16300 S. Harlem Avenue from 5:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. The Village of Tinley Park joined thousands of other communities across the country in promoting cooperative police-community crime prevention efforts. This year's National Night Out celebration was dedicated to the memory of Tinley Park Police Chief, Michael J. O'Connell who passed away in May, 2011, and was a great supporter of National Night Out.

Visitors to the event were able to meet and greet our K-9 Officer Bob Diorio, and Police Dog, Thor, who gave a demonstration highlighting the unique abilities that Thor brings to our Police Department. Also on hand to greet attendees were Motorcycle Officer Anthony Trinidad, SSERT Officer Sgt. Keith Sullivan, Bike Patrol Officer Brian Krotser, and Animal Control Officer, Kim Tessmann, along with representatives from the 911 Center, Crime Prevention, Emergency Management Agency, Fire Department, and Public Works Department. Residents were able to sign up for the Neighborhood Watch Program, get information on the current laws governing child safety seats, get outfitted with tactical gear, and climb on board Public Works and Fire Department vehicles.

Face painting was provided by Dotsie the Clown, and representatives of CN Railroad helped kids learn about train safety while they rode on "Little Obie The Train" Magician/Juggler, David Fleming and Whirlwind Karaoke D.J. Services entertained the crowd as well as Family Martial Arts of Mokena whose students gave demonstrations of their skills. Twenty-five classic car owners brought their vehicles to display at a Classic Car Show and ten "best in Show" certificates were awarded. Forty-three local business and organizations participated in the event.

Approximately 2,600 people visited National Night Out and participated in the many activities. Tinley Park Police Department raffled three child safety seats and three bicycle locks and visitors enjoyed 500 bottles of water, 600 cups of Culver's custard and 600 bags of popcorn generously donated by Marcus Theatre. A good time was had by all, in spite of the heat and humidity and they're looking forward to August 7, 2012 at Zabrocki Plaza with a car show. Target is a corporate sponsor of National Night Out and Tinley Park Police had been awarded a \$1000.00 grant through the "Target N Blue" program to assist in funding National Night Out.

For the fifth straight year, Tinley Park has been named a National Award Winner in its population category for the Police Department's 2011 National Night Out event. The Police Department was lauded by the "National Association of Town Watch" for its outstanding participation in the crime, drug and violence prevention program. Other Illinois communities who received the award in the same population category were Orland Park and Arlington Heights. Tinley Park was one of only 39 National Night Out winners across the country in its population category.

## Neighborhood Watch

The Neighborhood Watch program was redeveloped in 2010. Residents who were previously involved with the program were contacted and new residents are encouraged to join by signing up on the Village of Tinley Park website: [www.tinleypark.org](http://www.tinleypark.org). Approximately 180 volunteers receive monthly emails with safety tips. Neighborhood Watch volunteers are encouraged to know their neighbors and report suspicious activities. Two annual Neighborhood Watch meetings are held per year at the Tinley Park Public Library. On March 10th, the guest presenter was Bill Bogdan, Disability Liaison, IL Secretary of State's Office who spoke on the services of the Secretary of State Driver's License Office. September 22<sup>nd</sup>, Skip Gonsoulin, Community Outreach Liaison, IL Attorney General's gave a presentation on current scams. The Tinley Park Police Department highly encourages citizens to report suspicious activities when it occurs so that we can be proactive in our fight against crime

## D.A.R.E.

**E**ach school is visited once a week for nine weeks by the assigned D.A.R.E. officer. Lessons last 40-50 minutes and involve students in a variety of written and verbal exercises. D.A.R.E. gives children the skills necessary to recognize and resist the subtle and overt pressures that cause them to experiment with drugs and alcohol. Along with learning how to react when offered drugs, children learn about peer pressure, self-concept improvement, handling stress, value judgments and risks, as well as respect for the law, personal safety.


A volunteer committee was formed in 1995 to assist with the D.A.R.E. program. It is composed of 20 members who attend monthly meetings and are closely associated with many D.A.R.E. projects that take place outside the classroom. They originally assisted with the first D.A.R.E. fest and now help with the annual D.A.R.E. Walk, splash day, and roller skating party. These events celebrate the D.A.R.E. student's accomplishments.




## Burglar Alarm Program

Every burglar alarm in Tinley Park needs to be registered. Businesses must pay an annual \$25.00 burglar alarm permit fee and there is no fee for residential alarm users. Emergency contact information is listed on the registration form and it assists the Tinley Park Police Department to make notification with property owners when they respond to the burglar alarm calls. Therefore it is very important to keep emergency contact information current. The first four false alarms in each calendar year are non chargeable. If a business has 5-7 false alarms, they are fined \$100, from 8-10 false alarms \$200, and any false alarm over 10 is \$300.

In 2011, \$33,225.00 was collected in permit fees and fines.



## Crime Free Housing

The Crime Free Housing Program is designed to help residents, landlords, managers of residential rental properties, and the police, to keep drugs and other illegal activity off residential rental property. It is a concept that took shape in Mesa, Arizona in 1992 and has spread across the United States and the globe. It encourages open communication and cooperation between tenants, landlords, and the police.



Tinley Park unveiled and launched the program in April 2009. The 3-phase program requires the landlord, who has properties with 3 or more rental units, to obtain a business license through the Village. The landlord is required to attend training that provides information on valuable strategies for managing rental properties. It utilizes a unique, three-part approach aimed at the crime prevention goal while maintaining a resident-friendly approach. Phase 2 and 3 are optional to the landlord but highly recommended. Phase 2 includes adding security enhancements to the property which are inspected and certified by the Village. Phase 3 consists of a 'safety social' where basic crime prevention techniques are provided to the tenants by the police department.

The crime free addendum to the lease is the backbone of the program. This document is signed by the tenant and basically assures that the tenant will not allow criminal activity to occur in and around their unit or they face possible eviction. It applies to the tenant, their family, and any friends who may visit or live at the location. This addendum is a court-tested, proven tool for the landlord to effectively deal with problem tenants.

Ken Karczewski is the current Crime Free Housing Officer for the Village of Tinley Park. He is a retired Police Officer with over 26 years of experience. He has served as a patrol officer, evidence technician, field training officer, Investigator, crime prevention and D.A.R.E. officer. Among his other current duties, he is also the Red Light Camera Administrator for the Village, and an authorized BASSET (Beverage Alcohol Sellers and Servers Education and Training) instructor.





## Lockup Population

In 2011, 199 arrestees were held in our temporary lockup where they later posted bond or were transported to the 5<sup>th</sup> District Bridgeview Courthouse.

This information is obtained from the "City Jail and Lockup Quarterly Population Report" which is submitted to the Illinois Department of Corrections in Springfield from the Tinley Park Police Records Division.




The UCR data is limited in that it measures only those crimes reported to the police. It is estimated that 1/3 to 1/2 of the crimes that occur never get

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## Investigations

Commander Pat McCain leads nine investigators who follow up on crimes and suspected criminal activity reported to the police department. Several investigations are also initiated should they receive information on suspected criminal activity. Investigators also process crime scenes for evidence follow crime trends, develop sources of information, act as liaisons between the schools and police department, and provide public presentations on a variety of topics. Although each investigator has his/her own area of expertise, such as auto theft, burglary and fraud, all are crossed trained and have the necessary knowledge, skills and abilities to investigate any type of crime.

## Investigations Division

**A**fter the Patrol Division gathers information regarding an incident or crime, it is turned over to the Investigations Division for additional investigation.

An investigator's duties include:

- To investigate all matters referred/assigned.
- To prepare/present the results of all investigations to the commanding officer of investigations for possible presentation to other law enforcement agencies, the prosecutor, or the judiciary.
- To interview without unnecessary delay the complainants, victims, and witnesses in all cases assigned.
- To cultivate sources of information that will aid in the solution of offenses/juvenile acts and the ability of the department to assist law enforcement agencies.
- Having a thorough knowledge of the Village, its constructive resources, and its destructive influences.
- All Investigators are required to be familiar with the guidelines and directives for performing their job safely.

The Tinley Park Investigations Unit is involved in fighting cybercrime. Although cybercrime is a relatively new concept and constantly evolving, it can be defined as illegal activities such as cyberstalking (email or instant messenger harassment), destruction of data and/or programs, forgery, fraud, or theft, that involves the use of a computer. Other illegal activities included: child exploitation, child pornography, and solicitation of sex from a minor.

While cybercrime is rising, the unit utilizes training in computer forensics to help solve cases. Computer hard drives, floppy disks, zip disks, tape back-ups, and CD ROMs are just a few of the items that are properly seized and used to identify complainants, witnesses, victims, and offenders.

### Lane Bryant

Since February 2, 2008 the Tinley Park Police Investigations Unit, along with the South Suburban Major Crimes Task Force, has aggressively been investigating the murders of five women at the Lane Bryant store in the Brookside Market Place. The investigation is ongoing and has encompassed help from many outside agencies which include Federal, State, local, international, and scientific sources.



## Evidence

Tinley Park full-time officers undergo numerous hours of evidence training through Northwestern University Center for Public Safety, Imprimus, and NEMRT. There are currently 26 officers who specialize in the crime scene technician field. They are trained in identifying, photographing, preserving, and collecting evidence and writing effective reports. Tinley Park handles the majority of cases, but calls out the Illinois State Police Crime Scene Unit for assistance on any crime involving death, life threatening injuries, or any scene that exceeds the abilities of the Tinley Park Crime Scene Unit.

Once evidence is collected and packaged, it is placed into evidence lockers. The evidence clerk maintains the chain of custody. The evidence description is entered into a computer database for inventory and storage. Evidence that needs to be processed for DNA or fingerprints is sent out to the Illinois State Police Crime Lab. The evidence information is entered into the Illinois State Police Crime Lab's secure web site called C.A.L.M.S. (Computer Aided Laboratory Management System). Our evidence clerk, Meryle Motz is a member of the International Association of Property and Evidence (IAPE) and the Illinois Association of Property and Evidence Managers (IAPEM).

Over the years, the evidence room had to be resized in order to accommodate the amount of evidence that has been collected due to increased case loads. The room has been organized with sliding shelf units, a separate secured storage for weapons, and is maintained in numerical case order.

Evidence is maintained until case conclusion or the statute of limitation has passed. If a case is complete, it can be returned to the owner by court order. If no owner has been determined, confiscate and destroy orders are sent to the appropriate court house so the evidence can be destroyed. 769 evidence cases were handled in 2011 versus 724 in 2010. 1637 evidence items were inventoried in 2011 versus 1854 in 2010.




## U.S. Customs

The Tinley Park Police Department has been providing Tinley Park Officers the opportunity to work with the Currency and Narcotics Task Force since 1992. This Task Force operates under the Department of Homeland Security. An Officer may be assigned to the task force working for the narcotics and money laundering unit known as I.C.E. (Investigation and Criminal Enforcement). As an I.C.E. Agent, they assist other case agents as well as serving as a lead case agent in several investigations for the United States Government. These investigations consist of interviewing suspects, victims, or witnesses, working undercover, and running surveillance on illegal operations.

Tinley Park Officers have assisted in the operations involving West African Nigerian criminals and Columbian and Mexican cartels. Due to heightened alert levels, the scope and responsibility of the Agents has been broadened to include monitoring and the situational apprehension of suspected terrorists traveling through U.S. Airports.

Since 2006, I.C.E. Task Force Officers, in conjunction with Special Agents, have seized over 1.4 million dollars related to the above mentioned investigations. The Village of Tinley Park receives a portion of the seizures. Each officer that has been selected to participate has gained a wealth of experience and knowledge that he / she would not have had an opportunity to acquire working with a local department.



## Sex Offender Tracking Team



In accordance with the Illinois Sex Offender Registration Act (730 ILCS 150/), convicted sex offenders who reside in Tinley Park and have been charged with any offense as listed in the Illinois Compiled Statutes (730 ILCS 150/2(B)) must register in Tinley Park. The Patrol Division handles all registration procedures which includes fingerprints, photos, and paperwork processing. For the past 5 years, Detective Tim Poulos has been responsible for updating and training the department on the sex offender registration process (General Order 4.3.6).

Under Illinois State Law (730 ILCS 150/8-5), the Tinley Park Police Department is required to conduct address verification checks on offenders once a year. Tracking sex offenders in our community is very important so research began on how to address the concern. Research led to a program that was implemented in Florida. Florida's program served as a model and platform for Tinley's Sex Offender Accountability General Order 4.3.9.

The Tinley Park Police Department goes beyond the once a year check by performing monthly checks. There are 20 patrol officers who check on Tinley's registered sexual offenders once a month. This is to assure their compliance with the state law, and the Tinley Park Police Department's general order.

Over the past 5 years, Tinley Park has averaged between 17–19 registered sex offenders living in the Village at one time.

The Illinois State Police provides an online listing of sex offenders required to register in the State of Illinois. The database is updated daily and allows searching by name, city, county, zip code, compliance status, or any combination thereof. In addition, geographic searching can now be performed by choosing the Mapping link in the menu or the Geographic Search option.

## Peer Jury

The Peer Jury Program is designed for first-time offenders under the age of 18 who are charged with minor or non-violent offenses. To participate in the program, the offender must first admit his/her guilt in exchange for not being petitioned to the juvenile court system. The parents of the offender must also sign an acknowledgement of these facts. A peer jury date is selected and the offender then appears in front of a jury.

The jury consists of jurors who are between the ages of 13 and 17, and are either a resident or high school student in Tinley Park. It is the jurors' job to interview the offender about his/her actions. After the interview, the offender and his/her parents are excused from the proceedings. The peer jurors deliberate for a short time and then assign an appropriate amount (ranging from one to twenty-five hours) of community service hours. In addition to community service, the juvenile may also have to write a letter of apology to the victim(s), an essay on a topic related to the situation, or watch a mandatory video in relation to the incident. The offender and his/her parents are called back into the jury room and advised of the sentence. All community service hours must be completed by the next peer jury date. If the offender does not complete the required hours, Juvenile Investigator Violetto has the option of voiding their sentence and ordering the offender to appear before a Circuit Judge of Cook County in the juvenile court system.

Over the years, this program has been very successful. It reduces the amount of juvenile crime and in addition, raises the awareness level of the criminal system/proceedings.




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## Operations

**C**ommander Steve Vaccaro is head of the Operations Division, which includes all uniformed personnel. The division is responsible for controlling and preventing crime through regular patrol, answering calls for service, parking enforcement, investigating accidents that result in serious injury or death, apprehending offenders, crime scene processing services, managing crowds at large public events, enforcing traffic laws, and directing operations at critical events.

## Animal Control

The Tinley Park Animal Control Officer (ACO) is responsible for providing non-police enforcement related services that do not involve criminal investigation. The ACO focuses on locating, capturing, and transporting to the shelter, animals running at large or presenting health and safety issues. The ACO responds to and investigates complaints concerning domestic and non domestic animal problems or violations of animal control ordinance. These concerns include but are not limited to: animals running at large, bites, property damage or injuries, cruelty, neglect or abandonment, removing injured or dangerous animals from both public and private property; notifying pet owners of impoundment, releasing pets to owners upon payment of fees, arranging for adoption or disposal of unknown pets, investigating violations of animal control and animal welfare ordinances and issuing warning or citations as required, appearing in court to testify in animal control cases, enforcing animal control ordinances, and presentations to the community. The ACO is knowledgeable on the physical and behavioral characteristics of common breeds of dogs and cats and their care and feeding. She also has expertise in the most humane methods and techniques used for handling and capturing of both domestic and wild animals.

Since 2008, Kim Tessman has been working with the Village of Tinley Park and our community addressing animal care and control issues. Kim previously worked for five years in Hammond, Indiana as an Animal Control Officer before tackling the enormous task in Tinley Park. She is certified in Equine rescue, utilization of the Taser, and Euthanasia methods. Kim spends time explaining the animal control field and position during career days held in the area. She also works closely with P.A.W.S. (Peoples Animal Welfare Society) with adoptions and aggressive animals. She has been referred to as the dog whisperer – a person who can effectively work with temperamental animals addressing leadership, discipline, and affection issues.

## Bike Patrol

The Tinley Park Bike Patrol Unit consists of 11 officers who patrol Tinley Park parks and neighborhoods while adding a personal touch by interacting with the community. This unit is activated April through October, weather permitting. Due to periodic staffing levels the bike patrol unit operates on an 'as-needed' basis at the discretion of the bike officers themselves. Their bicycle patrol activities have been effective both in dealing with the criminal element and as a great public relations tool by dealing with and meeting people face-to-face while working on the street.

Officers become Certified Bike Patrol Officers after successful completion of the training provided by in-house trainers or the Illinois Police Mountain Bike Association (IPMBA). Their training includes: bike maintenance, emergency skills, health/nutrition, riding techniques, rules of the road, and police tactics. Classroom instruction and real life training (riding as partners, amongst crowds, over objects and down stairs) has laid the foundation for their expertise.

The unit has a huge advantage when patrolling the community unlike patrolling in a squad car. Quiet, cost efficient, very effective, and extreme mobility are a few of the unit's advantages. The greatest advantage though is the stealth effect. Since a bike makes little to no noise, criminals can be observed and approached without being noticed. Criminal activity can be deterred significantly when the unit is in full force.

Our unit is also used to educate other cyclists on bicycle safety and the rules of the road. They are visible at "National Night Out", Village parades, and the Special Olympics Torch Run. They are a great resource to discuss helmet safety and their benefits. If you need assistance or information on bike safety, ask any bike Officer when you see them on the road.

## First Midwest Bank Amphitheatre

Tinley Park's Full-time and Part-time Officers provide added support for the patrons, security, and staff of the First Midwest Bank Amphitheatre. Part-time Officers manage the flow of traffic around

## ILEAS

In 2002, Illinois Law Enforcement Alarm System (ILEAS) was formed to provide mutual aid, emergency response, and additional resources for public safety. Illinois is divided into regions where ILEAS members can respond rapidly in case of an emergency. In the past, region members have been deployed to Minnesota for the Republican National Convention, were on stand-by for the Freedom Motor Run for a possible disturbance by the Hells Angels motorcycle gang, and responded to Richton Park to assist when a tornado struck. In 2009, region members were deployed to Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania for the G20 Summit, and in 2011, responded to the flooding in Cairo, Illinois and assisted local departments with patrol duties.

The Tinley Park Police Department has four officers assigned the Illinois Law Enforcement Alarm System (ILEAS) Region 3 Central Mobile Field Force team. 4 additional members from our Department were added to the new Region 4 South team which serves the Southern Cook County area.

Our officers attend quarterly training in Joliet in order to prepare themselves for different incidents they might have to respond to. Geared with helmets, gas masks, shin guards, knee pads, full hand, arm, and chest protection; they are ready for incidents such as riots and emergency responses.

ILEAS teams are respected nationally as the model Mobile Field Force program.



**K**-9 units are used for a variety of police functions such as searching for lost persons, searching for hidden subjects, apprehending fleeing suspects, clearing businesses, residences, and vehicles, and detecting narcotics.

Currently, Officer Bob Diorio serves as the K-9 handler. Thor was born October 8th, 2003 in Germany. He underwent his initial training there and

then 8 weeks at the Landheim K9 facility in Dyer Indiana. Diorio reported to the Landheim facility in May 2006 to train with a variety of canines. Handlers and canines are paired together after Landheim team members watch both interact.

Our current canine Thor, weighing in at 99 pounds, is a full blood German Shepherd Dog. Both Diorio and Thor are nationally certified by the North American Police Work Dog Association in narcotics detection, patrol, and police utility. Both have appeared in Tinley Park during demonstrations at the National Night Out, block parties, and school events. They have been called to assist surrounding area agencies (e.g. Illinois State Police, Chicago, Chicago Heights, and Plainfield) with real time incidents.

## Part Time Officer Program

Tinley's full-time force is supplemented by fourteen part-time officers who are required to work ten hours of mandatory patrol duties, attend three hours of classroom training, attend three hours of firearm training, and perform five hours of community policing per month. Their functions include:

- Special enforcement details: seat belts, village stickers, DUI
- Holiday season mall presence
- Traffic control at the First Midwest Amphitheatre
- Security for community events
- Additional staffing for the street units
- Liquor establishment checks on Thursday and Saturday nights
- Processing prisoners on weekend nights
- Tinley Wish program coordination

According to House Bill (P.A. 89-170) officers become certified by the State of Illinois after they complete 480 hours of training through the STTAR (Specialized Training Testing and Record keeping) program which is offered through NEMRT (North East Multi-Regional Training). The approximate nine month program consists of internet and classroom based lectures which are supplemented by practical exercises.

## S.S.E.R.T.




The Tinley Park Police Department participates in a multi-jurisdictional special weapons and tactics team known as S.S.E.R.T. (South Suburban Emergency Response Team). They respond to high risk critical incidents throughout the south suburban area. The team is composed of over 100 personnel from over 30 law enforcement agencies. Tinley Park currently has one full time and three part-time officers assigned to the team.

S.S.E.R.T. responds to over 50 requests for assistance each year. These requests range from high risk warrant service to hostage rescue situations. Team members are all state certified and attend between 16 and 24 hours of formal training per month.

## Accident Investigations

**S**even highly trained officers respond to the scenes of serious injury or fatal motor vehicle crashes. These officers attended training at the Northwestern University Center for Public Safety, a worldwide recognized leader in the field of crash investigation. Currently, Commander Steve Vaccaro, Sergeant Chris Butler and Officer Mike O'Hern are state certified traffic crash reconstruction specialists who are qualified to evaluate, analyze, and interpret the evidence at the scene of a crash to determine the cause. This training is highly technical and requires skills in evidence technology and advanced physics and mathematics. This team of officers can provide a detailed description of how and why a crash occurred, the speeds and direction of travel of the vehicles involved, the identification of drivers, and a scale diagram of the accident scene depicting the locations of the vehicles before, during, and after impact. This information is crucial in the criminal prosecution of vehicular homicide cases. This unit has frequently been sought out by outside law enforcement agencies to assist in their crash investigations.

The latest computer software technology is utilized to process crash scenes. Surveying equipment, commonly used by construction workers, helps the unit measure and document the evidence of a crash. The measurements obtained are then downloaded into a software program such as AutoCAD to create scene diagrams. If necessary, EDCRASH, a software simulation program, creates a computer simulation to analyze the crash. The unit, in association with the Illinois State Police Forensic team, has used animation software technology, such as 3D Studio Max, to help illustrate major crashes and aid in criminal prosecutions.



## D.U.I. Enforcement

Combating drunk drivers is a task that is taken very seriously by the Village of Tinley Park. Over 48,000 drivers were arrested in Illinois alone, with 401 arrests occurring in Tinley Park. In addition to active traffic enforcement, Tinley Park also participates in roadside safety checks and mock DUI presentations to high school students.



## Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Unit


The Tinley Park Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Unit pursues public safety through the reduction of commercial vehicle collisions and criminal activity by:

- Employing innovative and effective enforcement strategies based upon statistical data and local violation activity.
- Focusing on problem-specific activities in the commercial vehicle industry.
- Utilizing all available resources, including enforcement and education.

Fourteen officers are currently assigned to the truck enforcement unit. Their training includes 40 hours of basic truck enforcement which covers the designated roadway system, required vehicle components, vehicle weight limits, and commercial motor vehicle offenses. An additional four hours allows the officer to become portable scale certified. The portable scales are utilized during special details within the village and when the State of Illinois I-80 scale is closed.


All state and local laws and regulations pertaining to size, weight, driver qualifications, vehicle safety and hazardous materials are enforced fairly and impartially focusing upon the ultimate goal of traffic safety. This effort is approached as a partnership between the department, the trucking industry and the motoring public.

## Motorcycle Unit

The motorcycle unit consists of one Sergeant and three police officers who are specifically trained and assigned to work selective traffic enforcement in target areas and investigate traffic crashes.

Selected motor officers must have a valid Class M (motorcycle) driver's license and attend two weeks of high intensity training through the Northwestern University Center for Public Safety. Every year, they undergo a one week refresher class hosted by the South Suburban Motorcycle Officers Association.

The Police Department's mission statement is deeply rooted in the motor squad, which is demonstrated in motorcycle related projects throughout the year. Tinley Park's Police Motorcycle Officers have represented the department with pride at numerous events within the Village. They have honored our fallen officers from the State of Illinois at the Illinois Police Memorial in Springfield and have honored our fallen comrades from across the nation during Law Enforcement Week at the National Police Memorial services in Washington D.C.. The unit has also participated in the U.S. Marine Corps Toys for Tots Foundation run, B.A.C.A. (Bikers Against Child Abuse) run, Oak Park Avenue's Christmas Parade of Lights, funeral escorts for fallen officers and soldiers, and the escort of veterans who are returning from Middle East conflicts. Besides seeing them on the street, Tinley's Harley's can be seen featured at block parties, Cops & Kids Day, National Night Out Against Crime, and Discover Tinley Expo.

## Parking Enforcement

Within the village boundaries, Tinley Park offers a variety of parking locations. From the streets, to private parking lots, shopping centers, or the Metra commuter lots, the Village has ordinances regulating parking. Tinley Park officers patrol the locations enforcing state and local laws. Officers have the discretion of issuing a local parking ticket, for unoccupied vehicles, or issuing a state citation for occupied vehicles. Typical violations include:

- Illegal parking in handicap zones
- Failure to pay commuter lot fees
- Obstructing fire lanes/hydrants
- No parking zones, and
- Overnight parking

The Parking Enforcement Officer assists with code enforcement and provides information to the public regarding parking locations and regulations. He maintains the parking enforcement records and cash collected at the train station parking lots. Local monthly court is held at the police station for those wishing to dispute any citation received.

## Red Light Enforcement

In the summer of 2009, the red light camera system was implemented in Tinley Park in order to address traffic safety concerns at qualified intersections. When a driver fails to stop at a red light, pedestrians and other motorists are at risk. Red light cameras capture, via video and still photography, those drivers who fail to stop for red lights.

The Village of Tinley Park selected Red Flex Traffic Systems, Inc as the provider of photo enforcement technology. Three high traffic crash and violation areas were chosen for the implementation of the program. The cameras are located at:

1. 159th St. / Harlem Ave. for northbound traffic
2. 171st St. / Harlem Ave. for southbound traffic
3. 183rd St. / Harlem Ave. for southbound traffic

Violations are recorded after the red light has been red for one tenth of a second. Red Flex personnel review the violations and either reject or approve the violations before they are submitted electronically to the Tinley Park Police Department for further review. Upon review by Police personnel, the violation can be rejected or accepted. The fine for a violation is \$100.00.

Over 4300 violations were reviewed by Police personnel. The following table is a breakdown of violations recorded, reviewed, accepted, and approved:

Based on Red Flex Inc revenue reports, \$342,229.00 was collected from violators during calendar year 2011. This sum does not include the annual administrative costs to Red Flex of running the camera program.

## Traffic Stop Study

Under Public Act 093-0209 and 094-0997 (625 ILCS 5/11-212), law enforcement agencies are mandated to provide annual data about traffic stops. Illinois became one of the first states to implement the program. This is an effort to identify any racial bias that may occur in police traffic stops.

The Center for Public Safety at Northwestern University analyzed the data from 2004-2007 and the Center for Research in Law and Justice at University of Illinois at Chicago analyzed the data from 2008.



## Traffic Safety Unit

The Tinley Park Police Department Traffic Safety Unit is committed to providing a safe community for the citizens, motorists, bicyclists, and pedestrians in the Village. We have created a community policing partnership through education, assisting citizens in solving traffic safety concerns and problems, enforcement of traffic safety laws, and recommending traffic engineering improvements.

The Unit currently consists of one police officer supervised by one police sergeant. While still a part of the patrol division, the unit operates independently of patrol scheduling. The officer assigned to the Unit is a traffic reconstruction specialist, motorcycle officer, and truck enforcement officer. The Traffic Safety Unit allows for coordination and integration with other specialty units such as the Truck Enforcement Unit and Accident Investigation Unit.

Some of the Traffic Safety Unit duties include:

- Identification of areas within the community that require additional traffic enforcement efforts and the application of those efforts.
- Responding to traffic related citizen complaints.
- Examining areas of concern such as school zones that may require a traffic study to identify the need for engineering improvements.
- Conducting traffic studies.
- Recommending engineering improvements when appropriate.
- Completion of traffic crash reconstruction reports.
- Prioritize enforcement locations and deploy traffic radar speed trailer.
- Participate in educational campaigns.
- Participate in special enforcement events such as speed, D.U.I., and campaigns sponsored by the Illinois Department of Transportation.

## Police Officer Qualifications

In order to become a Tinley Park Police Officer, all applicants:

- Must be a high school graduate with at least two (2) years of satisfactory certified law enforcement experience or,
- Must possess an Associate degrees with an emphasis in Criminal Justice or,
- Must have at least 60 college credit hours with an emphasis in Criminal Justice or,
- Possess a Bachelor of Arts or Science degree from a four (4) year college or university.
- Must be a U.S. Citizen.
- Must be 21 or older.

## Health and Fitness

It is very important to live a healthy and active lifestyle. When you exercise routinely, you feel good, look good, develop a strong immune system, increase your daily energy levels, create self-confidence, develop a better attitude and outlook on life, reduce the potential for injuries, and reduce stress. Located within the police department and available 24 hours, is a fitness room that contains free weights, nautilus equipment, treadmills, a stair master, and a free standing bike. While staying in shape, employees can watch TV, a video, or listen to their favorite music. Industry experts say that sustaining a well balanced diet and exercising for at least 30 minutes a day will assist in creating a strong mental, physical, and spiritual health platform.

## Training

The Tinley Park Police Department takes training of personnel seriously. Officers attend training seminars on a monthly basis in a classroom and hands on environment hosted by instructors from the Illinois State Police, NEMRT, Tinley Park, and other law enforcement agencies. Officers are lectured, view videos and computer illustrations, and participate in hands on activities. Some of the topics include: communications tactics, criminal and Illinois vehicle code law changes and clarifications, officer safety issues, hazardous materials awareness, tactical skills techniques, truck enforcement, and updates on criminal proceedings.

Tinley Park Officers train with their firearms several times throughout the year. In addition to monthly live fire training, officers practice tactical deployment to active shooter incidents, mechanical breaching, high risk traffic stop procedures, officer down rescue, perimeter tactics, and less than lethal weapons deployment.

Dry fire simulation, paint based marking cartridges, and PRISM video training are also used to increase marksmanship proficiency and add realism to the use of force training. The South Suburban Chief's Association purchased a PRISM unit which allows officers to train in a realistic use of force setting. The computer based program allows an officer to be placed in different settings such as domestic disturbances or hostage situations. Depending on their verbal and non-verbal actions, the trainer can change the offender and victim actions.

Officers are required to qualify in both daylight and low light settings with their duty sidearm and shotgun two times a year. Officers who elect to carry a patrol rifle receive additional training and qualify in both daylight and low light environments. Off-duty handgun training and qualification is done on an annual basis.

Officers receive annual training and recertification in the use of less than lethal tools including: O.C. (pepper) spray, ASP expandable baton, and the Taser electronic restraint device. Control tactics and handcuffing are also reviewed annually to ensure compliance with our use of force policy.

## Firearms Training

The Tinley Park Police Department fires in excess of 60,000 rounds of ammunition each year in order to keep police officers proficient in the use of their firearms.

The department maintains an indoor live fire range with a classroom and weapons maintenance area. Outdoor training is conducted at various locations in and around Tinley Park. Department firearms and control tactics instructors are all state certified through the University of Illinois Police Training Institute.
